Goal:

Continuity of Education is the overall term for any educational practices that occur in the event of a prolonged school closure. All students at Twin Spring Farm must have the opportunity to maintain and develop skills while away from their typical school and classroom environment. This will be accomplished through both Planned Instruction and Enrichment Review.

Overview of the Plan:

Twin Spring Farm Administration believes it is imperative to remain faithful to our school mission and make a good faith effort to provide instruction that replicates, to the best of our ability, a classroom experience. We are all committed to providing opportunities for continued learning and progress to all of our students.

Expectations for Teaching and Learning:

Nursery:

-Constant Contact emails to parents providing activities for the following disciplines:

-Letter/letter sound recognition

-Math concepts, to include: number recognition, patterning, sequencing, grouping -Fine motor skills, to include: pre-writing, writing skills, fine motor development for pencil grip and scissors

-Science, to include: STEM (STEAM) projects with household items, nature discovery -Gross motor skills, to include: whole body movement activities for strength and stamina -Art

-Music Education and Instruction provided by music teacher to families through Constant Contact and social media

-When available, Zoom classroom meeting for social interactions between classmates

Kindergarten:

-Constant Contact and/or emails to families providing curriculum extras for enrichment and reinforcement

-Google classroom lessons provided by teacher to continue daily lessons and provide check-ins -Zoom meetings between TSF teaching staff and students

For All Levels:

-Lessons will follow the Scope and Sequence as noted in the age level curriculum guidelines -Lessons to support learning targets and engage students each day

-Lessons provided to families allow students to complete on their time frame. Students will be provided links to activities to complete at a convenient time

Communication Tools and Strategies:

Communication will be provided to families through email. Constant Contact email blasts are sent to the most current email addresses for both parents/guardians listed in the student's contact information.

In addition to communication sent through Constant Contact, the same information will be posted on social media outlets

Kindergarten will be provided additional Google classroom resources.

Twin Spring Farm Administration will be available through email in the event of an office closure.

Any office hours that will be provided will be posted on Constant Contact, social media, One-call System, or phone system with the office.

One-call System communication will be provided for additional information, i.e. school closures or emergency information. This system provides parents/guardians with an instant email, phone call, and text message.

Available staff to provide lessons and maintain parent communication.
